Reading celebrations

We love to celebrate reading at Gamlingay Village Primary. It is the gateway to so much other learning – a poem that reflects your emotions in PSHE, the diary entry of a historical figure, a newspaper report on a geographical phenomenon or a science book on how the body works.

Children begin their reading journey at home, before they start school – they learn how to turn pages and read pictures.

When children start school in EYFS and Key Stage 1, we teach them to read through reading practice sessions three times a week. These:

- are taught by a fully trained adult to small groups of approximately six children
- use books matched to the children's secure phonic knowledge using the *Little Wandle Letters and Sounds Revised* assessments and book matching grids.
- are monitored by the class teacher, who rotates and works with each group on a regular basis.

Each reading practice session has a clear focus, so that the demands of the session do not overload the children's working memory. The reading practice sessions have been designed to focus on three key reading skills:

- decoding
- prosody: teaching children to read with understanding and expression
- comprehension: teaching children to understand the text.

Once children become **fluent** independent readers, they move on to using Accelerated Reader. Children take a star quiz which guides them to which level of books they should read to challenge themselves. Then, children read books and do quizzes on what they have read; this helps teachers track their understanding of the book, and where they need support. Accelerated Reader tracks the number of books and words that children have read. We regularly celebrate children in assembly who have read over 1 millions words. Currently we have some children who have read over 5 million words during their time in Key Stage 2! Every child who reads over a million words gets a **Word Millionaire** Certificate. This half-term, we also awarded a certificate to the class that had read the most books!

We love having a library at the centre of the school – but our avid readers need more books. If you have any books suitable for children over 7, that you are finished with, and they are in good condition, please consider **donating** them to the library. Please hand them in to the school office, saying that they are for the library.
